Easter: God's Answer to Good Friday

It seems particularly fitting for us who live near the 45th parallel north that Good

Friday and Easter show up on the calendar when they do. Heavy outerwear, having fulfilled its annual service is stored in closets and winter boots no longer clutter entryways. The frozen earth has loosened its grip on dormant life allowing it to awaken once again. From front yard gardens and walkways, tulip, daffodil and iris greet passersby, and the anticipation of family gatherings on sunny backyard decks and beachfronts create visions of an impending, eternal summer. For me, spring has always brought with it a sense of cheer, gladness and renewal.

In Christendom, we know the story well: Jesus' sacrificial death abrogated the law that demanded the death penalty for our rebellion and sin. His resurrection abolished the stranglehold of death, insuring that though our mortal bodies die, we shall one day, with new bodies live again.

That's the narrative. We hear it every year. For most of us, it's a familiar story with comforting words, but whose profound significance is easily missed.

Horror ... Grief ... Despair

A friend. A son. A presumed saviour

Sunday: Death Defeated

Astonishment ... Wonder ... Exhilaration

is nailed to a rugged crossbeam and left to die.

The physical suffering was excruciating. Think of it: spikes driven though your feet and hands. Why would God allow that? Though there is more that we don't know than there is that we do, we can surmise two things: first, God's love for his human creation is immense. Second, it appears that there was no other way to atone for our sin.

Sin and Death

Jesus died to break the stranglehold of evil – that deep-rooted, rebellious nature or principle that drives our resistance to God's sovereignty. His sacrifice was a paid-in-full act that forever satisfies the requirement of blood for the remission of sin (note the prophetic message of Isaiah 53:6). The penalty for the commission of sins past, present and future has been paid. It is a gift offered to all who will receive it. The full meaning of Friday becomes clearer and more personal when we recognize the depth of our own unworthiness as measured by the immensity of Jesus' suffering. The Holy One who knew no sin was contaminated by the very sin for which he came to atone. He, on our behalf suffers its penalty. That, as I understand it is the bare bones meaning of Friday.

Saturday: Disorientation

The stone that guarded the entrance has been moved revealing an empty tomb.

Friday was a dark, somber day;
Saturday was disorienting, but the
dawning of Sunday sent shock
waves through the small community
of disciples. First reports by Mary
and the other women created a kind
of hopeful disbelief that drove Peter
to the tomb to see for himself. What
he found was exactly as reported.
The stone guarding the tomb was
moved away from the entrance. The
linen grave clothes lay limp and
vacant on the stone slab, and Jesus
was nowhere in sight.

Then the report of the Emmaus
Road disciples, Mary's encounter
with Jesus at the tomb and his
several appearance to other
believers settled the matter for all but
Thomas. His earlier words make
sense now. He has risen just as he
said.

Christ's resurrection comes with an invitation and a promise: an invitation to believe and follow, and the promise of eternal life on the new earth, the experience of which will tax the capacities of every sensory portal. Imagine: myriad expressions of beauty and pleasure ever new; work without weariness; self-expression without inhibition, and exposure without fear thanks to our risen Lord. What is Easter's answer

Confusion ... Disappointment ... Despair

We thought you were the Christ. Why? How? What now?

What were they to think? The one in whom they had placed their trust, whom they had confessed as the Christ, in whom they had fixed their hope for the redemption of Israel, now lay embalmed on a stone slab in the company of the millions who died before him. No difference. No dramatic rescue. No kingdom.

Three years of close contact with Jesus whom they had come to believe was the true Son of God. Three years of observing miraculous deliverances from disease, blindness and death. Three years of friendship. Three years of anticipation.

Saturday was cloaked in disorientation and disappointment.

to Good Friday? Just this: Grace has embraced Justice and given wings to hope.

I am the resurrection and the life! He that believes in me will live, even though he dies; and whoever lives and believes in me will never die.
